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All shall observe self-discipline on Ekadashi (the eleventh day of each half of every lunar month), Janmashthami (birthday of Lord Shree Krishna) and birth anniversaries of other deities, Shivratri etc., and celebrate them with great reverence and festivity.

## Jay Swaminarayan

### **Maha Shivratri – 2<sup>nd</sup> March (Maha Vad 14)**

Maha—Great

Shiva—Lord Shiva

Ratri—Night

Shivaratri falls on the fourteenth day of dark half of every month but this day in Maha is The Great Night of Shiva and is dedicated to his worship. The origin of Shivaratri is attributed to several stories in Hindu mythology. One of the origins traces it back to the churning of the Ocean of milk by Devas (Gods) and Aasuras (demons) to obtain amrita (Nectar giving immortal life). Whilst churning the ocean many unusual items appeared from the ocean one of which included a deadly poison. As soon as they touched the poison, it exploded into poisonous fumes and threatened the entire universe. The frightened Devas ran to Brahma and Vishnu for assistance, but neither was able to help and sent them to Shiva. Due to Shiva's nature he agreed to help. He raised his Trident to condense the fumes and drank the poison but only to hold it in His throat. The Devas worshipped Lord Shiva for saving the universe. The poison left a dark blue mark on his neck and this is why he was called Neelkanth (blue-neck).



### **Holi – 19<sup>th</sup> March (Fagan Sud 15)**

There are several stories related to this day but the most renowned is that of Prahlad and his unbroken devotion for Narayan. Prahlad's father Hiranyakashipu, a demon king regarded Lord Vishnu as his enemy. Hiranyakashipu tormented Prahlad in attempt to stop him from worshipping Lord Vishnu. Prahlad would show no retaliation but simply chant Lord Vishnu's name knowing that Lord Vishnu would protect him. Realising the strength of Prahlad's devotion and that he could not stop Prahlad's worshipping, Hiranyakashipu decided to burn Prahlad. He ordered his Evil demon sister Holika to wear her magical chundari that would protect her from fire when worn over her head. Holika took Prahlad on her lap and sat on the pyre. As the pyre was set alight a gust of wind blew Holika's Chundari off her head and on to Prahlad. Holika was burnt alive and the magical Chundari protected Prahlad.

### **Fuldol Utsav - NarNarayandev Jayanti – 20<sup>th</sup> March (Fagan Vad 1)**

Utsav - Festival

This day marks the birth of the King of Bharatkhand, Shree Nar Narayan Rushi. On this day, all the Devtas swung Shree Nar Narayan Dev on a swing made up of flowers, hence the name Fuldol Utsav. We carry out the celebration in the same way, by residing Nar Narayan Rushi on a Hindolo made out of flowers.

## Vachanamrut of Bhagwan Swaminarayan (Panchala 3)

### Wordly Desires

How can we get rid of the worldly pleasures and from which status can we allow these thoughts to prevail. Maharaj explains that we should get rid of our thoughts and actions regarding worldly desires which develop from the senses.



Maharaj explains that one should think that I am not the body or any of its elements and senses, but I am different from these, I am the atma (soul) and a devotee of Bhagwan. And if the senses misbehave as they often do, they should be disciplined in the following way. One should ask the sense 'do you wish to see the beauty of Bhagwan only, or do you also wish to see the beauty of others? Do you wish to listen to sounds related to Bhagwan only and experience smells related to Him, or do you also wish to listen to other sounds and experience other smells? If you do crave the sensory desires leaving Bhagwan aside, then what is there between you and me? Who are you and who am I? I will have absolutely nothing to do with you. Whatever you do, you (the body) will have to bear the consequences'.

In this way one should lecture their senses and pray to Bhagwan saying "O Maharaj! O Swami! You intensely love your bhaktas! You are an ocean of mercy! The fault lies with the indriyas (senses) and antah-karans. I am distinct from them. In fact, they are my enemies. So, please protect me from their influence'.


## Humanity is the biggest religion
